



Funds for Access to Restricted Data from the PSID

CSDA invites applications for funds (\$750) to pay for access to restricted data from the Panel Study of Income Dynamics (PSID), pending formal approval from the University of Michigan. More information about the restricted access version of the PSID and how to apply for access may be found here:

**Due date for applications:** as needed basis.

**Who is eligible:** Support is available to current associates of CSDA and to any faculty who seek to become associates.

**Focus of projects:** Applicants must show how their proposed research with the PSID fits into and advances at least one of CSDA's main research themes: 1) health, health disparities, and biodemography; 2) life course research; 3) immigration and internal migration; 4) spatial demography; and 5) data and methods for population research. CSDA is particularly interested in projects that are interdisciplinary, collaborative, and that will advance the careers of junior faculty.

**What to submit:** Applicants must submit a single PDF file that includes: 1) a cover page with a 300-word abstract that summarizes the significance and innovation of the project, and that explains how it fits into CSDA's main research themes; 2) the research plan that is included with the application to gain access to the PSID (see the PSID website -- <https://simba.isr.umich.edu/restricted/ProcessReq.aspx>); and 3) NIH biosketch forms for all investigators.

**Requirements:** In accepting the \$750 funds to access the restricted version of the PSID data, project leaders will agree to the following: 1) acknowledge support from CSDA in any papers, publications, or presentations based on the project (guidance will be provided upon receipt of the funds); and 2) provide copies of any products supported by the award to [csda@albany.edu](mailto:csda@albany.edu);

Beyond these two requirements, project leaders are strongly encouraged to apply for external funds to advance the research based upon working with the restricted data; applications that adhere to the funding priorities of the Population Dynamics Branch (PDB) of the *Eunice Kennedy Shriver* National Institute of Child Health and Human Development (NICHD) are particularly encouraged. **Review of applications** will be conducted by the CSDA Executive Committee. Priority will be given to applications approved by the University of Michigan to use the PSID. In addition, the extent to which the proposed project: 1) helps advance CSDA's research themes; 2) demonstrates relevance to the general field of demography; and 3) may provide the potential to serve as a basis for a follow-up NICHD research proposal (e.g., R01, R03, R21, or career development award) will be important considerations. Junior faculty will be given priority.
